FROM THE MINISTER

Hello Everyone,

I am thankful that during these strange times week after week the news I have had from the majority of you has been good and positive reporting your safety and well-being. I give thanks for that indeed.

We have now entered a time when the strict restrictions of previous months are easing, indeed we're being actively encouraged to step out and re-enter the world. That also presents its own set of challenges.

A friend was sharing how strange it felt to get behind the steering wheel of her car after months of it stood in the driveway. She had worried she would have forgotten 'what went where' thankfully she was soon reassured of that but the feeling of strangeness persisted throughout her initial drive.

As a church we have now received 'green light' to re-open our buildings but we still have to adhere to the many guidelines for our safety and wellbeing. These currently include socially distanced seating, a one-way entry and exit flow and a limit on the length of services (30-40 minutes is the recommendation). Singing as a congregation remains forbidden. As Methodists whose tradition it is to sing our faith this could be rather unsatisfactory. The use of books – pew bibles, hymnbooks or service books is also forbidden – for the reason that virus can linger in these and be transmitted with use. These pose a number of challenges. Lockdown has led to the 'discovery' of technology as the means to new ways of being and doing church. Proof of how good we are at adapting as humans is that this has almost become the 'new normal'.

There are of course many benefits to this 'new normal'.

I received a 'selfie' recently from someone out walking with the family in the woods on a Sunday morning and at the same time following the service via their phone internet. I was able to see myself in the picture leading the service with the family in the woodland setting. I also heard from someone sharing how much she had enjoyed listening to the service at home and in her own time and wondering whether she would ever get back into the routine of attending church at a set time on a Sunday morning. The flexibility of lockdown technology has been considerable with the added

bonus that being online has enabled many unknown others to hear the 'good news' by joining our services. Weekly viewing figures have confirmed this. Adapting to change can be tricky but also very rewarding not least in urging us to reconsider our reasons for doing what we have always done. It allows us to be objective and to think what might no longer be important or what might serve better or be more relevant.

Last week as managing trustees of the church we met (online) to talk through some of these issues in relation to the reopening of the church building. We agreed to do this in stages beginning in August with set periods of time for individual prayer thus giving people a gentle reintroduction to returning to using the building for worship and then to restart Sunday service sometime in September.

However, guidelines change all the time so here's to hoping that we might see further easements between now and September. I ask your prayers for the small action group led by David that has been appointed to lead on this project.

Scripture tells us of the many instances of change and how people inspired by God have responded to such circumstances. The disciples and followers of Jesus following the death of Jesus were in a time of fear. In John 20:19 we are told they were 'hiding behind locked doors for fear of the Jewish leaders' but then came the day of Pentecost and what transformation! Gone was the fear and in its place a tremendous zeal for sharing the good news to all. I pray we may know that confidence in this time of change as the Holy Spirit inspires and leads us on.

Change of another sort is also on the cards. By now you might know that I will be leaving the Circuit next July. It means that as a Circuit (and church) we will be in what is referred to as "stationing"; the process to appoint a new minister. Itinerancy is one of the very wise practices of Methodism which allows for a change for both church and minister every few years. A bit like crop rotation in the vegetable garden it offers the promise of enriching and benefiting both church and minister in this way. I can confidently say my time here has been enriching and beneficial indeed. I ask your prayers for all involved in this process of stationing particularly our local reps, church and

Circuit Stewards, members of the church community and for myself and Ralph.

Let us also remember and pray for any going through any particular time of change or anxiety and any going through illness or significant loss at this time.

Throughout this period of change may we seek to know God's plan and purpose and confidently place ourselves under his guidance and know His peace.

If the London Marathon is again postponed I shall do a solo marathon run in the Merstham/ Redhill/ Horley area instead!

BIBLE MONTH - A REFLECTION

A summary of Spurgeon's comments on Ruth's declaration to Naomi and reflection on it as a confession of love for Naomi which made her become a follower of Naomi's God......the comments in Italics (mine) are for clarification. Anyone wishing to see the very detailed and admirable commentary by Spurgeon could view it on the internet as 'Sturgeons sermon on Ruth'.

1. The affection for the Godly should influence us to Godliness . Ruth had lived with Naomi even before her husband died, as did her father in law. The deep faith and acceptance of Gods will by her must have made Ruth admire Naomi and made Ruth wonder about this God who provided such inner strength.

a. The influence of their companionship. *Ruth saw in Naomi an unusual mother in law who would have made her even in those days a personal maid or someone to just be a person at her beck and call, but a friend who shared her joys and sorrows. The fact that the three of them had begun their trek to Bethlehem together shows*

the love of Naomi who might have really meant to take both of them with her to prevent them starving in Moab.

b.The influence of admiration of Naomi.

In Ruth's case it was her admiration of the whole personality of Naomi, like the disciples' following of Jesus.

c. The influence of their instructions...

The advice that Naomi must have given Ruth during the mourning periods could have been very different from the Heathen rituals followed by the Moabites and may have given Ruth more freedom and joy even as a widow

d. The wish to cheer the person whom they so love.

This is a very common reaction to love. This desire could make us wish even to follow their beliefs and/or to learn more about it.... .

e.The fear of separation.

When Naomi requested them in no uncertain terms to go back to their community, it must have been her realisation –after they began their journey

... that she also needed to provide husbands as well as food for these two young widows. She explains the reason why that was not possible for her.

2. Resolves to Godliness will be tested.

It had been tested by the poverty and sorrow of her mother in law.

b. When Ruth was told to count the cost by her mother in law.

c. Ruth was tested by the apparent coldness of one in whom she trusted.

d. Ruth was shaken also by the going back of Orpah. by the silence of Naomi.

3. Godliness must mainly lie in the choice of God.

a. God is the choicest possession of a believer.

b. Henceforth God was to Ruth the ruler and law giver as for Naomi.

c. He must be her instructor.

d.Her entire trust and stay,

4. This decision should lead Ruth (us) to cast our lot With God's people as well as with Himself.

Casting our lot with Christ is the best thing and the most joyous action any human being who wants to have the abundant Life could possibly take.

Spurgeon emphasises the fact that as Jesus said (Luke17:10) "in the same way I tell you that there is rejoicing in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner who repent"
